




Enrolled House Bill 4002

SECTION 37. (1) The Oregon Criminal Justice Commission shall establish a statewide system for tracking simple, clear and meaningful data concerning deflection program outcomes, including connections to social services and criminal justice system avoidance, and other data deemed relevant that is timely and easily accessed to inform best practices and improve outcomes for individual program participants.

(2)(a) No later than 12 months after the effective date of this 2024 Act, the commission shall conduct a study to determine best practices for deflection programs and make recommendations for funding of the Oregon Behavioral Health Deflection Program described in section 76 of this 2024 Act. In making the recommendations described in this paragraph, the commission shall consider the best available information and projections regarding deflection programs in this state.

IMPACTS database development

- Worked with IMPACTS grantees to identify program outcomes
- Developed a web-based database for sites to track client-level data
- Continue to improve the database based on grantee feedback
- Provide ongoing support to ensure accurate data collection that reflects the accomplishments of each site

IMPACTS database structure

- Who is entering data
- Pathways into IMPACTS services
- Demographic information
- Mental health and substance use disorders
- Encounters with criminal justice and health systems
- Living arrangements and employment status
- Services needed, provided, and needs resolved

IMPACTS database example

Date of client's first contact with IMPACTS or your best estimate. (For example, when was the first peer outreach attempt or direct referral from law enforcement?)



Our plan and approach: BHD data tracking


- Meet with Behavioral Health Deflection (BHD) early adopters to learn about program structure and goals, staffing, data availability
